



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FRIEND OF CHILDREN AWARD RECIPIENT



Janis Ferre

After the birth of her second son, born 10 weeks prematurely which led to developmental delays and deafness, Jan learned she would really need to actively advocate for her own son when the Utah School for the Deaf wouldn't accept him into their preschool program. Advocating for her own children led her to an avocation of advocacy for other people.

More than 40 years ago, Jan helped to form the Legislative Coalition for People with Disabilities LCPD, a nonprofit organization which advocates for public policy affecting all Utahns who have disabilities. Jan has worked tirelessly and extremely effectively to see that the rights of people with disabilities are protected.



Jan has a great relationship with many Legislators. They respect her opinions and knowledge and often consult with her regarding people with disabilities. Jan is a member of the ICC (Interagency Coordinating Council) for Baby Watch Early Intervention Program and has served as a member of the Utah PTA Special Needs Committee since it's creation in 2013. Karen Conder, Utah PTA Special Needs Specialist, says that "she has been a great resource to our committee because of her in-depth knowledge of legislative bills and disability issues." Also, Jan brought the LCPD into the successful fight against vouchers through referendum in 2007. She understood that giving vouchers for children to receive an education outside of the public education system was not in the best interests of any of the State's children.

Mrs. Jennie Taylor is the wife and Gold Star Widow of Utah Army National Guard Major Brent Taylor, who was killed in action in Afghanistan in November of 2018 while on a leave of absence from his position as Mayor of North Ogden City, Utah. Major and Mrs. Taylor are the parents of seven children. She is the founder and director of the Major Brent Taylor Foundation, a founding member of Follow the Flag—North Ogden, and an active volunteer in her children's public schools.

A former secondary educator of history, government and psychology classes, Mrs. Taylor has a passion for helping today's youth prepare to become tomorrow's leaders. She is currently serving as the Civilian Aide to the Secretary of the Army for the State of Utah and the Utah PTA Military Families Specialist Assistant and continually looks for ways to carry on her husband's legacy of service to God, family and country.

CHILDREN'S ENVIRONMENTAL RIGHTS

- WHEREAS, The commitment to the protection of children's health and well-being is a fundamental priority of the PTA; we acknowledge the need to address air and water quality issues to mitigate the health risks posed to our state's children; and
- WHEREAS, Children's health is important to their development and well-being; environmental pollution, particularly air and water pollution, poses significant risks to children's health, leading to illnesses and potential long-term issues; and
- WHEREAS, Environmental preservation aligns with the protection of children's rights, ensuring they are shielded from potential harm arising from environmental degradation; and
- WHEREAS, Scientific research has established a clear link between environmental pollutants and negative health outcomes in children beginning as early as perinatal development; and
- WHEREAS, Governments and organizations worldwide have recognized the importance of environmental protection and its direct impact on public health; and
- WHEREAS, Children are more vulnerable to air pollution as they inhale a larger volume of pollutants relative to their body weight compared to adults, and Utah currently ranks within the top 25 states experiencing elevated levels of air pollution; and
- WHEREAS, The availability of clean and safe water is an essential element of children's health; and, the conservation of water resources is vital to ensure an enduring supply of fresh water for current and future generations, thereby contributing to children's wellbeing; now, therefore, be it

- RESOLVED, That Utah PTA calls on governments at all levels to enact and enforce policies and regulations aimed at reducing air and water pollution, with a specific focus on areas where children are most vulnerable, such as schools and residential areas; be it further
- RESOLVED, That Utah PTA recognizes the critical role that local governments, businesses and individuals play in preserving the environment and safeguarding the health of our communities, and supports the creation of policies and programs that provide incentives to support environmental initiatives; be it further
- RESOLVED, That Utah PTA encourages the creation and adoption of sustainable and environmentally-safe policies regarding practices in industries and agriculture to reduce pollution and promote clean air and water; be it further
- RESOLVED, That Utah PTA advocate for increased public awareness and education about the impact of environmental pollution on children's health, empowering parents, and communities to take action; be it further
- RESOLVED, That Utah PTA calls on governments, organizations, and individuals to invest in cleaner technologies, renewable energy sources, and infrastructure improvements that will lead to a healthier environment for all of Utah's children; be it further
- RESOLVED, That Utah PTA collaborates with parents, students, and community partners to urge local, state, and national leaders to support research and adopt policies and legislation that encourages efficient water management and promote water conservation best practices in our communities, including educating children and their families about responsible water usage; and be it further
- RESOLVED, That Utah PTA pledges to monitor and assess progress in achieving these goals to ensure the well-being of future generations.

CHILD PEDESTRIAN SAFETY RESOLUTION

UTAH PTA SAF 2024-1

WHEREAS,Two of the purposes of PTA are to promote the welfare of children and youth in home, school, places of worship and throughout the community, and to advocate for laws that further the education, physical and mental health, welfare and safety of children and youth;

WHEREAS, Nationally, one of the leading causes of pedestrian fatalities is street crossings; there has been an increase in pedestrian traffic fatalities, indicating walking is more dangerous; Utah law does not mandate bus transportation for students in grades K-6 living less than 1.5 miles from school, and those in grades 7-12 living less than 2 miles from school, therefore, the majority of children in Utah are not eligible for school-provided transportation;

WHEREAS, Planning, education and technology can improve street safety to reduce injuries and fatalities, with efforts such as school safe routing plans, teaching proper pedestrian procedures, speed limit enforcement; including automated technology, and implementation of traffic calming measures;

WHEREAS, There has been an increase of distracted driving incidents and distracted drivers not only endanger themselves but also their passengers, pedestrians and people in other vehicles;

RESOLVED, That Utah PTA and its constituent associations encourage the Utah Department of Public Safety to update and review training programs for school crossing guards, as well as emphasize pedestrian safety in Drivers Education; and also urge the Utah State Board of Education (USBE) to implement a robust pedestrian safety curriculum for Utah schools; moreover, local PTAs are encouraged to take an active role in educating parents and students about pedestrian safety issues and solutions; and furthermore, compel the Utah State Legislature and other government agencies to appropriate adequate funding specifically dedicated to safe school routes, pedestrian safety devices and technology to ensure safer street crossings; and be it further

RESOLVED, That Utah PTA and its constituent associations prompt parental and local PTA engagement in reviewing and providing input pedestrian safety for each school's Safe Neighbor Access Program (SNAP) Plan, and encourage parent involvement in school safety committees and community councils, collaborate with government agencies; and urge local governments to rigorously enforce speed limits in the vicinity of school routes, and be it further resolved that

RESOLVED that Utah PTA and its constituent associations educate families and school communities of the serious consequences of distracted driving, encourage community members to pledge their commitment to prioritize pedestrian safety, and be it further

RESOLVED that Utah PTA and its constituent associations advocate for the establishment and strict enforcement of comprehensive laws related to distracted driving.



- 1. All voting delegates MUST have their membership registered on the membership list of their local PTA/PTSA and on the books of the Treasurer of Utah PTA fourteen (14) days preceding the annual conference (Utah PTA Bylaws). All delegates are verified by Utah PTA prior to the Conference.

- 4. Workshop presenters and guests shall be provided with identification badges entitling them to limited admission at the discretion of Utah PTA.
- 5. During the general sessions, non-voting attendees will be observers only as per Utah PTA Bylaws. (ARTICLE XXII:Section 7)
- 6. In-person delegates are requested to be seated before the opening of each session.
- 7. No message is to be presented directly to the chair (the president). All messages and announcements must be given to a designated person at the floor microphone or through the zoom chat.
- 8. During the business portion of the meeting, the Zoom Chat feature shall be reserved for virtual delegates who wish to speak to the business.
- 9. Any person disrupting the business of the conference shall be asked to leave the meeting or be removed from the webinar.
- 10. The minutes of the conference shall be approved by a committee appointed by the president.
- 11. Utah PTA Bylaw ARTICLE XXVI: Parliamentary Authority Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the conference in all cases not provided for in Utah PTA Bylaws or these Conference Rules.

CONVENTION MICROPHONE PROCEDURES

To expedite convention business, the following microphone procedures are being used:

There will be two microphones, numbered 1 and 2, on the floor as follows:

MICROPHONE 1 OR 2:

For interrupting motions, such as for a parliamentary inquiry, point of order, appeal, point of information, motion to reconsider, or personal privilege.

MICROPHONE 1:

For delegates wishing to speak **FOR** a motion or to make an amendment

MICROPHONE 2:

For delegates wishing to speak **AGAINST** a motion or to make an amendment

SPEAKING AND VOTING PROCEDURES

- 1. Voting delegates must be present in person or virtually to vote.
- 2. Delegates must be a member of a Utah PTA unit to make motions, debate, and vote.
- 3. No delegate may represent more than one PTA unit when voting.
- 4. Only voting delegates may comment or vote on a question.
- 5. In-person delegates must come to the microphone on the floor and be acknowledged by the chair before speaking and writing their name, the name of the unit represented, and the unit location.
- 6. Virtual delegates shall raise their hand using the Zoom raise hand feature and type their name, the name of the unit represented, the unit location, and their purpose for commenting (for, against, or question) in the Zoom Chat. Comments from virtual attendees will be taken in the order received through chat.
- 7. The designated person at the table will read any business received in the Zoom Chat once acknowledged by the chair.
- 8. Once acknowledged by the chair, the virtual attendee will be unmuted and allowed to speak.
- g. Comments from all delegates are limited to two minutes at a time on any question and only twice on the same question. No delegate may comment a second time until all delegates seeking recognition have had an opportunity to speak.
- 10. To make a second comment, delegates must follow the same process to be acknowledged and given the ability to comment again. Delegates must observe the timer on the screen.
- 11. No business shall be on the floor more than 10 minutes unless debate time is extended. To extend debate time, the motion to extend debate must be adopted by a two-thirds vote. Inquiry motions or points of order do not count in the 10 minutes.
- 12. The chair shall recognize delegates "FOR" and "AGAINST" a motion in alternating order.
- 13. Point of Order (Questions) take priority over other business.
- 14. Amendments to the Resolutions may be to the Resolved statements only.
- 15. Bylaws may not be amended on the floor and are a Yes or No vote only.
- 16. To stop debate and force the vote, a member should obtain the floor and say, "I call the previous question." This requires a second and a two-thirds vote.
- 17. If discussion is needed, the question on a motion should not be called until there has been a reasonable amount of discussion on both sides of the issue, at least two "FOR" and two "AGAINST".
- 18. A tie vote is a lost vote.
- 19. Hasty action may be corrected by use of the motion to reconsider. The motion may be made only by one who voted on the prevailing side.

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
