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

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FRIEND OF CHILDREN AWARD RECIPIENT



Paula Plant was born in Salt Lake City to Doug and Thais Williams. She was the 2nd of six children and was instrumental in helping with childcare responsibilities for her younger brothers. She graduated from East High School and the University of Utah with a Bachelor's Degree of Fine Arts in Ballet w/a Teaching Emphasis.

Her time working with the PTA began as she embarked on raising her own four children as she felt it was important to be involved in her kids' educations and also their schools. She recalls her early experiences volunteering for the PTA mostly involved fundraising for Upland Terrace Elementary School and Wasatch Junior High School in the Granite School District. She has fond memories of helping good friends like Jody Morgan organize magazine drives and sales of coupon books. While her youngest son, Michael, was attending Skyline High School, Paula was asked by the school PTA president, Jill Healey, to be the Legislative Vice President of the Skyline High PTA. She was assured it would be a lot of fun, and she would only need to go to "a few meetings."

While attending one of the "few meetings" that year at the state capitol, she sat in a training conducted by Margaret Bird on trust lands in Utah and how they could benefit school children. She specifically remembers Margaret emphasizing that if managed correctly this program could be "so much better than a bake sale." As she listened to this presentation, she recalled working on her family ranch outside of Hurricane, Utah with her Grandpa Thurston one summer. One morning as they were leaving to work, he proclaimed that, "today we are going to work on the school land." They spent the day mending fences, moving salt rocks, and tending to cattle. At the end of the day when the work had been completed, Paula asked, "Grandpa, where was the school?" Her Grandpa Thurston had a good chuckle and went on to explain that this was land the family leased from the school trust program. She didn't think anything of this interaction again until sitting in this training at the state capitol.

For the first 100 years, trust lands were not so beneficial for Utah's students. In 1989, the Utah PTA passed a resolution that began a dedicated effort among education groups to address the missteps of the past. After education groups came together with a united voice, state legislative changes resulted in the creation of the School and Institutional Trust Lands Administration (SITLA) in 1994.

During this time Paula was volunteering with the Utah PTA on their Legislative Action Committee as Utah PTA Legislative Vice-President, and also as the Utah PTA's Trust Lands Appointee. While in these volunteer positions, Paula worked with other state leaders on a land swap for state trust lands that had become encumbered when President Bill Clinton established the Grand-Staircase

Escalante National Monument. Paula testified before the United States Congress multiple times during this process to ensure that Utah's school children received fair compensation for these trust lands. This land swap included giving SITLA control of new lands outside of the monument as well as a payment to the trust of \$50 million dollars. Paula's work along with many others including Margaret Bird and Utah House of Representatives member, Mel Brown, ensured that this money stayed out of the state's general fund and would be controlled by local school community councils for academic needs, thus creating the Utah School LAND Trust Program as we know it.

Besides the work Paula did in helping create the School LAND Trust Program, her work with the PTA during these years was also instrumental in the creation and passage of Utah's Indoor Clean Air Act, lowering the age of consent, and also the creation of Utah's graduated driver's license.

As the School LAND Trust Program grew, Paula moved into a position with the State Office of Education and is now the Director of the School Children's Trust at the State Board of Education. Paula recalls the first year the trust had reached a level where schools were set to receive a distribution. Late in the legislative session, the state treasurer met with her to explain that because of that year's inflation the distributions would need be withheld from schools. Her work, along with the help of the state Attorney General and Representative Brown, ensured that schools did receive that first payment and would continue to receive payments going forward. All those involved in the process were very excited to send out payments to schools that year that ended up distributing about \$10 per student to each local school in Utah.

Since that time, she has worked with the trust system to improve policy at the school, district, state, and congressional levels to protect the trusts and its beneficiaries' rights. She has been instrumental in protecting the trust lands and advocating for better management of the funds which in turn benefits every child in Utah. The Utah School Trust Land fund has grown from that initial \$50 million in 1994 to approximately \$3.4 billion today. Paula will always share that there have been many people that have worked to create and maintain a school land trust program that benefits the children of Utah. This unsung work has put the trust on track to distribute more than \$106 million to Utah schools next year and over \$111 million in 2026. That first distribution of \$10 per student will have grown to an average distribution of \$166 per student in fiscal year 2026.

Imagine for a moment the impact these millions of dollars have had on Utah's children in the 30 plus years Paula has been working in this program. Her work alongside many others has been instrumental in helping every child's potential become a reality.



KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



Stacey Bess is an award-winning educator with great insight into the hearts of children in need. She believes that the way to most effectively teach children any subject is to treat them with love and kindness. Audiences around the nation have discovered the treasure of Stacey Bess and the magic she works with children.

Bess began her teaching career at The School With No Name located inside the Salt Lake City shelter where she taught math reading and self worth to homeless and transient children. By the end of her first term she was discouraged and often distraught by the circumstances facing the children who were so easy to love, but whose lives were so insecure. Often she wanted to give up, but decided the children deserved her best efforts. While working at The School With No Name, Bess chronicled the heart-wrenching stories of her students so she would never forget how far these children had come. After reviewing the stories, she discovered profound life-lessons and eventually published a book, Nobody Don't Love Nobody.

After Bess published her first book and gained the support of the Utah community, people began to notice Bess and her unusual success with "hopeless" children. She has won prestigious local and national awards. A highlight came when she was honored with the esteemed National Jefferson Award, along with First Lady Barbara Bush, Supreme Court Justice Harry Blackman and Ambassador Walter Annenberg.

- WHEREAS up to 15%-20% of the general population display signs or symptoms of dyslexia and in Utah Code, dyslexia is currently defined as "a learning disorder that is neurological in origin and is characterized by difficulties with accurate or fluent word recognition; and poor spelling and decoding abilities; and typically results from a deficit in the phonological component of language that is often unexpected in relation to other cognitive abilities and the provision of effective classroom instruction;" and
- WHEREAS, The term dyslexia is found in 49 states' laws, including Utah Education Code, and in Federal law under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) within the broad eligibility category of Specific Learning Disability (SLD), yet many public schools have historically avoided the term "dyslexia" in evaluations when determining special education eligibility, and in Individual Education Plans (IEPs)
- WHEREAS, Without appropriate remediation, most students who struggle to learn to read continue to struggle with lasting consequences including not reaching college and career readiness, increased risk of not earning a high school diploma, and social/emotional problems including depression, anxiety, and poor self-image; and
- WHEREAS, There is compelling scientific evidence that early identification and intervention using an evidence-based Structured Literacy instruction based on the Science of Reading, which is a multimodal, direct, explicit, structured, and sequential approach to instructing pupils with dyslexia improves literacy outcomes for most students with symptoms of dyslexia and other struggling readers; and
- WHEREAS, Most teacher preparation programs provide limited training regarding dyslexia, appropriate accommodations, or evidence-based Structured Literacy Instruction based on the Science of Reading, leaving most teachers unprepared to adequately address the learning needs of children with dyslexia and other struggling readers; now, therefore, be it

- RESOLVED, That Utah PTA and its constituent associations recognize that dyslexia and other specific learning disabilities have significant educational implications that need to be better addressed by public schools and school districts and be it further
- RESOLVED, That Utah PTA, and its constituent associations support teacher and staff training necessary to improve the understanding of dyslexia and other specific learning disabilities and their warning signs, including training in the implementation of best practices based on the Science of Reading and to promote knowledge of appropriate accommodations for students with dyslexia and those that struggle with reading; and be it further
- RESOLVED, That Utah PTA and its constituent associations collaborate with schools and community organizations to educate parents, school administrators, and teachers about dyslexia and other specific learning disabilities, their early warning signs, and appropriate educational interventions; and be it further
- RESOLVED, That Utah PTA and its constituent associations support funded legislation to assist in training teachers, other school personnel and parents in early identification, appropriate education intervention, and assistive technologies for dyslexia and other specific learning disabilities.



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

IN-PERSON AND VIRTUAL ATTENDEE CONVENTION RULES

- 1. All voting delegates MUST have their membership registered on the membership list of their local PTA/PTSA and on the books of the Treasurer of Utah PTA fourteen (14) days preceding the annual conference (Utah PTA Bylaws). All delegates are verified by Utah PTA prior to the Conference.
- 2. Non-voting delegates may attend all meetings of the conference, provided they register and pay a fee.
- 3. A badge shall be provided for in-person entrance to meetings. Badges will be required for in-person admission to all portions of the conference.
- 4. Workshop presenters and guests shall be provided with identification badges entitling them to limited admission at the discretion of Utah PTA.
- 5. During the general sessions, non-voting attendees will be observers only as per Utah PTA Bylaws. (ARTICLE XXII:Section 7)
- 6. In-person delegates are requested to be seated before the opening of each session.
- 7. No message is to be presented directly to the chair (the president). All messages and announcements must be given to a designated person at the floor microphone or through the zoom chat.
- 8. During the business portion of the meeting, the Zoom Chat feature shall be reserved for virtual delegates who wish to speak to the business.
- 9. Any person disrupting the business of the conference shall be asked to leave the meeting or be removed from the webinar.
- 10. The minutes of the conference shall be approved by a committee appointed by the president.
- 11. Utah PTA Bylaw ARTICLE XXVI: Parliamentary Authority Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the conference in all cases not provided for in Utah PTA Bylaws or these Conference Rules.

CONVENTION MICROPHONE PROCEDURES

To expedite convention business, the following microphone procedures are being used:

There will be two microphones, numbered 1 and 2, on the floor as follows:

MICROPHONE 1 OR 2:

For interrupting motions, such as for a parliamentary inquiry, point of order, appeal, point of information, motion to reconsider, or personal privilege.

MICROPHONE 1:

For delegates wishing to speak **FOR** a motion or to make an amendment

MICROPHONE 2:

For delegates wishing to speak **AGAINST** a motion or to make an amendment

SPEAKING AND VOTING PROCEDURES

- Voting delegates must be present in person or virtually to vote.
- 2. Delegates must be a member of a Utah PTA unit to make motions, debate, and vote.
- 3. No delegate may represent more than one PTA unit when voting.
- 4. Only voting delegates may comment or vote on a question.
- 5. In-person delegates must come to the microphone on the floor and be acknowledged by the chair before speaking and writing their name, the name of the unit represented, and the unit location.
- 6. Virtual delegates shall raise their hand using the Zoom raise hand feature and type their name, the name of the unit represented, the unit location, and their purpose for commenting (for, against, or question) in the Zoom Chat. Comments from virtual attendees will be taken in the order received through chat.
- 7. The designated person at the table will read any business received in the Zoom Chat once acknowledged by the chair.
- 8. Once acknowledged by the chair, the virtual attendee will be unmuted and allowed to speak.
- g. Comments from all delegates are limited to two minutes at a time on any question and only twice on the same question. No delegate may comment a second time until all delegates seeking recognition have had an opportunity to speak.
- 10. To make a second comment, delegates must follow the same process to be acknowledged and given the ability to comment again. Delegates must observe the timer on the screen.
- 11. No business shall be on the floor more than 10 minutes unless debate time is extended. To extend debate time, the motion to extend debate must be adopted by a two-thirds vote. Inquiry motions or points of order do not count in the 10 minutes.
- 12. The chair shall recognize delegates "FOR" and "AGAINST" a motion in alternating order.
- 13. Point of Order (Questions) take priority over other business.
- 14. Amendments to the Resolutions may be to the Resolved statements only.
- 15. Bylaws may not be amended on the floor and are a Yes or No vote only.
- 16. To stop debate and force the vote, a member should obtain the floor and say, "I call the previous question." This requires a second and a two-thirds vote.
- 17. If discussion is needed, the question on a motion should not be called until there has been a reasonable amount of discussion on both sides of the issue, at least two "FOR" and two "AGAINST".
- 18. A tie vote is a lost vote.
- 19. Hasty action may be corrected by use of the motion to reconsider. The motion may be made only by one who voted on the prevailing side.


