HB0030 | MATH TEACHER TRAINING PROGRAM AMENDMENTS

Sponsor: Edwards, Rebecca P.

Status: Governor Signed

Fiscal Note: No fiscal impact

Description:

This bill expands a grant program for teacher training in math by allowing a grant to be used to provide a stipend, professional development, and leadership opportunities to an experienced mathematics teacher to assist the teacher in becoming a teacher leader.

Impact on Children:

Math is a subject area where many children struggle. Advancing the teaching skills of math teachers and giving excellent teachers an incentive to remain in the teaching profession and mentor other teachers will help children to succeed with this increasingly critical thinking skill.

PTA Resolution: EDU 2011-1 Excellence in Teaching

Notes: Resolved, That Utah PTA support high standards for teacher preparation, licensing, hiring, recertification, professional development, particularly for beginning teachers, and ongoing training as curriculum changes, in order to promote the academic achievement of all students and and be it further Resolved, That Utah PTA support adequate funding for and encourage consideration of financial incentives to recruit and retain highly qualified and effective educators.

HB0042 S1 | EARLY LEARNING AMENDMENTS

Sponsor: Snow, V. Lowry



Status: House substituted bill

Fiscal Note: This legislation appropriates \$17,500,000 from the Education Fund to the State Board of Education for optional enhanced kindergarten competitive grants. The bill also rescinds

a presumed base budget appropriation of \$7,500,000 from the Education Fund to the Related to Basic Early Intervention Program, for a net increase in appropriations of \$10,000,000. Of the total appropriation, the State Board can use up to one percent

(\$175,000) for administrative costs.

Description:

This bill requires the State Board of Education to develop kindergarten entry and exit assessments for use by certain kindergarten student academic improvement programs. They will also administer a grant program to support certain kindergarten student academic improvement programs and gives rule making authority. This bill also recodifies and makes technical changes to provisions related to early interactive reading software and allows a public school to use an early interactive reading software license for a student in grade 4, 5, or 6 under certain circumstances.

Impact on Children:


This establishes a grant program for LEAs that desire to offer an extended day kindergarten focusing on helping students at risk of experiencing intergenerational poverty and performing below grade level in reading. It also funds a grant for educational technology programs for use in grades 1-6.

PTA Resolution: FAM 2014-1 Intergenerational Poverty

Notes: That Utah PTA support programs that help mentoring families, including those that focus on the individual or family for a significant amount of time, teaching parenting skills, promoting continuing education, encouraging good health care for themselves and their children, and helping children succeed in school.

HB0364S02 and HB0049S03 | **SUICIDE PREVENTION** **AMENDMENTS and CLEAN** **FUEL SCHOOL BUSES AND** **INFRASTRUCTURE**

Status: Governor Signed and Enacting Clause Stricken

Fiscal Note: This bill appropriates \$20 million one-time from the Education Fund in FY 2016 to the State Board of Education to award grants to local education agencies for new school buses, alternative fuel fueling stations, and bus shop retrofits.

Description:

This bill: ▶ amends State Board of Education and Division of Substance Abuse and Mental Health program components for suicide prevention, ▶ amends interim committee reporting requirements, This bill: ▶ provides funding for a qualifying school district or charter school: • to replace a school bus manufactured before 2002 with a new school bus that uses alternative fuel or clean diesel fuel and provide infrastructure to support new school buses, or • if a qualifying school district does not have any school buses manufactured before 2002, or the need for infrastructure to support clean fuel buses, for other infrastructure purposes, ▶ requires the State Board of Education to make rules, and ▶ requires the State Board of Education to: • facilitate training for bus drivers and bus shop technicians on the operation and maintenance of a school bus that uses alternative fuel, and and • make a report to the Legislature.

Impact on Children:

Interventions provided in this bill will have the potential of dramatically reducing the number of youth suicides. and The policy change can, and will, seriously affect education funding. Currently, transportation is funded at 63% of funding and the change will spread the dollars even thinner.

PTA Resolution: HEA 1998-3 Youth Suicide Prevention and Environmental Health and Safety Position Statement

Notes: That the Utah Congress of Parents and Teachers support legislation and school district programs which address the development and implementation of a comprehensive (K-12) age appropriate youth suicide prevention program in all school districts in Utah, That these programs include in-service classes for school personnel, classroom discussions, films, awareness presentations for parents, coordination of school and community resources, confidential record keeping, and other materials and methods as they are developed and approved, That such programs be conducted by professional personnel trained in the youth suicide prevention, school counselors, school psychologists, school workers, etc., That the Utah Legislature be encouraged to provide adequate funding to provide suicide prevention programs in every district and school in the State of Utah., and Promote "reduce, re-use, and recycle" policies and support incentives for pollution prevention and natural resource conservation activities. Improve the quality of our physical environment by securing and monitoring the enforcement of stricter health and safety standards for contaminants and pollutants. Minimize the production of hazardous waste, and enforce strict compliance with rules that require the safe transportation, storage, management, and disposal of hazardous waste.

HB0061 S1 | CORPORATE FRANCHISE AND INCOME TAX CHANGES

Fiscal Note: Enactment of this bill may reduce revenue to the Education Fund by \$131,731,000 in FY 2017 and \$138,317,000 in

Description:

This bill addresses the apportionment of business income to the state for purposes of corporate franchise and income taxes

Impact on Children:

Passage of this bill will reduce the monies coming into the Education Fund from Income Tax by \$2,641,000.

HB0063S02 | DISTRACTED DRIVER AMENDMENTS

Sponsor: Anderegg, Jacob L.

Status: Enacting Clause Stricken

Fiscal Note: Enacting this bill could increase the amount the state will collect per applicable citation from \$100 to \$120. Surcharge revenue could also increase. There



were 1,394 similar convictions in the most recent fiscal year (34 at the state level and 1,360 at the local Justice Court level).



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Assuming the same number of convictions, state revenue could increase by \$10,100 annually beginning FY 2016 from increased fine and surcharge collections.

Description:

This bill modifies the Traffic Code by amending provisions relating to using a handheld wireless communication device while operating a moving motor vehicle.

Impact on Children:

► provides and amends definitions, ► amends the prohibition on using a handheld wireless communication device, and and ► amends the exceptions to the prohibition on using a handheld wireless communication device.

HB0094 S1 | LOCAL FUNDING OPTIONS FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION

Sponsor:



Thurston, Norman K.

Status: House comm - substitute recommendation

Fiscal Note: Enactment of this legislation may result in a cost to the state if administering this block grant program is in addition to the Utah State Office of Education's (USOE) current duties. However, depending on the scale of the program, there may be savings to offset that cost to the extent that USOE would no longer have to administer the current program. Costs will depend upon the number and size of districts participating in the new block grant program. Current overhead costs for administering existing programs is approximately 1.4% of pass-through funds. USOE estimates that the cost of this bill would be approximately \$125,000, which reflects one FTE (\$100,000) and current expenditures (\$25,000), ongoing per year beginning in FY 2017 for the five years of this pilot program. If a limited number of districts participate then the costs of monitoring could be less than one FTE.

Description:

This bill creates the Block Grant Funding Pilot Program.

Impact on Children:

This bill would allow local school districts to determine critical education needs and submit a proposal to the State School Board. If approved for participation, appropriated money could be used for any public education purpose.

PTA Resolution: EDU 2010-2 Education Funding

Notes: That Utah PTA encourage the legislature to adequately fund critical educational needs, including but not limited to, class size reduction, teacher salaries, technology, textbooks and supplies

Many smaller rural districts may not have the resources to put together a grant proposal. We need to ensure all districts have the opportunity to participate if desired.

Fiscal Note: No fiscal impact

Description:

This bill amends provisions of the Election Code relating to: the election of State Board of Education members and and inactive voters.

Impact on Children:

This bill will allow for a nonpartisan primary election for State School Board members.

PTA Resolution: EDU 2015-3 State Board of Education

Notes: That Utah PTA support legislation which enacts direct, nonpartisan election of State School Board members and opposes partisan election of the same body.

HB0139S03 | FOSTER HOME AMENDMENTS

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Status: Governor Signed

Fiscal Note: No fiscal impact

Description:

This Bill amends the definition of Foster Home to allow one more foster child to be placed in a foster home. It also defines the requirements for sibling groups to be placed in the same home.

Impact on Children:

Licensed foster homes are certified and overseen by the DCFS and are held to very high standards. Allowing these foster homes to provide a place for more children will ensure that those children are in a good situation in a home with a family environment. Allowing siblings to be placed together is very important for these children who have been removed from their parents.

PTA Resolution: FAM 1998-2 Foster Care Standards

HB0147 | DRIVER LICENSE TESTING AMENDMENTS

Sponsor: Eliason, Steve

Status: Enrolled



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Fiscal Note: This bill could cost the Department of Public Safety (DPS) \$36,000 one time in FY 2015 from the Department of Public Safety Restricted Account for 360 hours of programming to facilitate online testing for about 60,000 individuals annually.

Description:

This bill modifies the Uniform Driver License Act by amending provisions relating to driver license testing.

Impact on Children:

This bill: ▶ provides that if an applicant has been issued an equivalent learner permit by another state or branch of the United States Armed Forces, the applicant is subject to the driver education, testing, age, and fee requirements, ▶ provides that an applicant for an original or provisional class D license shall pass a knowledge test approved by the division, ▶ provides that a percentage of the test questions included in the knowledge test shall cover the topic of major causes of traffic related deaths as identified in statistics published by the Highway Safety Office, and and ▶ makes technical corrections.

PTA Resolution: National PTA Resolution on Teen Driving Safety

Notes: That PTA encourage the development of consistent, quality standards for driver education and training programs and support policies and legislation to make such programs accessible to all students.

HB0175 | PUBLIC EDUCATION EMPLOYMENT AMENDMENTS

Fiscal Note: No fiscal impact

Description:

This bill repeals provisions requiring a public school to provide or obtain certain information about a public school employee.

Impact on Children:

Passage of this bill will remove volunteers from being included as "employees" of a school requiring a full background check to work with children in an educational setting.

Description:

This bill modifies the Utah Criminal Code regarding abuse of a minor.

Impact on Children:

This bill modifies the definition of sexual abuse of a minor, aged 14 and 15, regarding the age differential between the offender and the victim changing it from seven years to four years.

PTA Resolution: FAM 2009-2 Child Abuse and Neglect

Notes: That Utah PTA and its constituent bodies advocate for adequate laws to protect children in all areas of child abuse, neglect, maltreatment, and exploitation. .

HB0193 S1 | CHARTER SCHOOL FUNDING AMENDMENTS

Status: House comm - substitute recommendation

Fiscal Note: No Fiscal Impact

Description:

This bill: ▶ amends the definition of "district local property tax revenues" to include school district revenues expended for recreational facilities and revenues received from certain state guarantees, ▶ defines terms, ▶ amends provisions that require a school district to allocate a certain portion of school district tax revenues for charter schools, ▶ amends charter school facility expenditures provisions, ▶ amends provisions related to the board local levy, ▶ creates a levy for charter school funding, ▶ provides for the distribution of revenues from the levy for charter school funding, ▶ establishes the Charter School Levy Account, and ▶ requires certain notice on the charter school funding levy

Impact on Children:

This bill would create greater accountability and transparency for charter schools by creating a separate property tax to fund them rather than diverting revenues from district

imposed property taxes.

PTA Resolution: National PTA Position Statement - Public Charter Schools

Notes: Public Charter Schools must be supported by specifically allocated public funds in amounts that do not exceed and do not divert funding from non-charter public schools.

We appreciate the compromise between HB193 and SB38 S4 that resulted in this substitute. We are concerned about the recreation levy going to charter schools when many charter schools when many charter students return to district schools for sports and other activities.

HB0198 | STRENGTHENING COLLEGE AND CAREER READINESS

Sponsor: Arent, Patrice M.

Status: Enrolled



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Fiscal Note: This bill appropriates \$440,000 one-time from the Education Fund in FY 2016 to the State Board of Education. Over the course of three years as outlined in the bill, the State Board of Education may award grants to local education agencies for payment of course fees for their counselors to aid in students' college and career readiness.

Description:

This bill creates a program to provide grants to local education agencies for professional development for school counselors.

Impact on Children:

When school counselors have greater professional skills, students may be able to receive counseling that will better prepare them for their future .

PTA Resolution: EDU 2013-2 Education Planning

Notes: Resolved, That Utah PTA and its constituent bodies work to fully implement the use of quality SEPs in its elementary schools and quality SEOPs in its junior high/middle schools and high schools.

HB0199S1 | PILOT PROGRAM FOR ASSISTANCE FOR CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES AND COMPLEX MEDICAL CONDITIONS

Sponsor: Redd, Edward

Status: Enrolled



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Fiscal Note: Enactment of this Legislation may result in ongoing costs of \$3,304,300 General Fund and \$7,840,500 federal funds to the Department of Health beginning in FY

2017 and \$29,300 General Fund and \$87,900 federal funds for the Department of Workforce Services beginning in FY 2016 to serve 500 children with disabilities and complex medical conditions in Medicaid. Costs in FY 2016 may be \$2,358,900 one-time General Fund and \$5,437,400 federal funds for the Department of Health. One-time costs in FY 2016 for the Department of Workforce Services may be \$5,300 General Fund and \$15,700 federal funds. Costs to the Department of Health are to provide Medicaid services and costs to the Department of Workforce Services are for 1.4 FTEs to determine Medicaid eligibility and changes to its eligibility determination computer system.

Description:

Directs the Department of Health to apply for a Medicaid waiver for children with disabilities and complex medical conditions.

Impact on Children:

The families of these children with disabilities and severe medical conditions struggle to pay for health care. This pilot program would allow families to get a Medicaid waiver to help cover the enormous cost of health care.

PTA Resolution: National Health Reform and Access to Care for Children, Youth, Families and Pregnant Women

Notes: Underserved Children, Families and Pregnant Women. There must be assurances that low income and other high risk families have coverage for services that may not be included in a basic benefit plan such as outreach, case management, transportation, home visits and child care.

HB0201 S2 | STUDENT TESTING AMENDMENTS

Status: Governor signed

Fiscal Note: No fiscal impact

Description:

This bill places restrictions on the use of end-of-level assessment scores for the evaluation and compensation of certain employees.

Impact on Children:

Basing teacher pay upon student performance on a test is likely to punish teachers who work with some of the most challenging, disadvantaged students.

HB0206 S1 | HUMAN TRAFFICKING SAFE HARBOR AMENDMENTS

Sponsor: Romero, Angela



Status: Governor Signed



Fiscal Note: Enactment of this legislation could increase costs to the Division of Child and Family Services (DCFS) by \$30,500 ongoing General Fund beginning in FY 2017 from referral of a child engaged in prostitution or sexual solicitation to DCFS upon the first offense instead of after the first offense.

Description:

This bill modifies the Utah Criminal Code and Juvenile Court Act regarding a child subjected to prostitution or human trafficking.

Impact on Children:

If this bill passes the Division of Child and Family Services will be required to provide services to a child who is engaged in prostitution or sexual solicitation. In addition, it allows that any child engaged in prostitution or sexual solicitation may not be subject to delinquency proceedings. It also amends the definition of abuse in the Juvenile Court Act to include human trafficking of a child for sexual exploitation.

PTA Resolution: NPTA Resoultion-Child Trafficking

Notes: That National PTA and its constituent organizations advocate for the protection of rights of victims and support efforts to provide measures for the physical, psychological, and social recovery of victims of child trafficking.

Fiscal Note: Enactment of this legislation may cost the Department of Health \$41,000 ongoing for personnel (0.5 FTE) to maintain the online education module and \$25,300 one-time to develop the website through which the online education module will be delivered, all from the General Fund beginning in FY 2017. The Department of Health has indicated it can absorb these costs within existing resources.

Description:

This bill: ▶ amends requirements for a student seeking an immunization exemption, ▶ requires the Department of Health to: • develop an immunization exemption form, • develop an education module, and • make rules, ▶ requires a local health department to issue an immunization exemption form under certain conditions, ▶ requires an individual to present a certificate of completion for an education module as a condition for receiving an exemption from required immunizations, ▶ enacts renewal requirements for an exemption from immunization, ▶ amends requirements for transferring a student's exemption from required immunizations to a new school, ▶ requires a school to maintain a list of students who have not received required immunizations, and ▶ amends provisions related to a conditional enrollment

Impact on Children:

Passage of this bill will tighten up rules on students who are exempted from receiving vaccinations against communicable diseases which includes an education component for

Fiscal Note: Enactment of this legislation could cost the Department of Human Services \$1,797,200 one-time from the General Fund in FY 2017 to put in place the interfaces and infrastructure required by this bill.

Description:

This bill clarifies the authority of the Department of Human Services related to developing a system of care for minors with complex emotional and behavioral needs, and modifies the components of a system of care, and authorizes the department to develop an information technology infrastructure to implement the system of care.

Impact on Children:

Substitue 1- renubmers the lines and adds in cleans up the wording, impact to children remains the same Children who are being treated for complex mental health issues need a lot of care. This bill will create the Systems of Care which will help the Department of Human Services ensure they are getting the care and support they need. There will also be support for the families of these children.

This bill modifies the Utah Criminal Code regarding the kidnapping, trafficking, and smuggling of persons younger than 18 years of age.

Impact on Children:

► modifies the definition of the crime of human trafficking of a child and and ► provides that a person who is convicted of human trafficking of a child is guilty of a first degree felony.

HB0263 | STATE SCHOOL BOARD POWERS MODIFICATIONS

Sponsor: Thurston, Noman K.



Status: Bill Failed House 3rd Reading 12-62-1

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Fiscal Note: No fiscal impact

Description:

This bill modifies provisions relating to state school board powers. Specifically, The Utah State Constitution states that "The general control and supervision of the public education system shall be vested in a State Board of Education." This bill defines "general control and supervision" such that "the State Board of Education shall direct and manage the public education system: (a) as the Legislature defines the public education system and and (b) in accordance with laws made by the Legislature. In addition, the Board rules must be "in accordance with laws made by the Legislature."

Impact on Children:

A single voice in the ear of a legislator can motivate the drafting of a bill that eventually becomes a law. The change in this bill turns the Legislature into a 104-member Super Board of Education and the State Board into their staff. These legislators, who are still further removed from the public school children, will continue to micromanage public education but this would now be sanctioned in law. Redefining the words of the Constitution is a serious matter.

HB0284S02 | MINOR ALCOHOL OR DRUG RELATED OFFENSES AND DRIVING PRIVILEGES

Sponsor: Redd, Edward H.



Status: Enrolled

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Fiscal Note: To the extent that additional staff are required to provide assessments and additional training, enactment of this bill could have a fiscal impact. The number of youth impacted by this bill is unknown at this time.

Description:

This bill modifies provisions relating to sentencing requirements for certain alcohol or drug related offenses.

Impact on Children:

► authorizes a court to order a screening, an assessment, and an educational series or substance abuse treatment if found appropriate by the screening or assessment for a

At full implementation in FY 2018, estimates indicate that the total cost to the state may increase by \$41,500,000 ongoing from the Education Fund to the Minimum School Program - Charter School Local Replacement Program. The FY 2017 amount is associated with including the revenue and expenditure sources in the formula with an estimated cost of \$13.8 million ongoing. The amount increases in FY 2018 based on growth in the included revenue and expenditure sources and projecting local property tax collections with an estimated cost of \$27.7 million ongoing.

Description:

" This bill: ▶ amends the definition of "district local property tax revenues" to include school district revenues expended for recreational facilities and revenues received from certain state guarantees, ▶ defines terms, ▶ amends provisions that require a school district to allocate a certain portion of school district tax revenues for charter schools, ▶ amends charter school facility expenditures provisions, ▶ amends provisions related to the board local levy, ▶ creates a levy for charter school funding, ▶ provides for the distribution of revenues from the levy for charter school funding, ▶ establishes the Charter School Levy Account, and ▶ requires certain notice on the charter school funding levy"

Impact on Children:

This bill would create greater accountability and transparency for charter schools by creating a separate property tax to fund them rather than diverting revenues from district imposed property taxes.



"This bill amends the name of the Child Abuse Advisory Council to the Child Welfare Improvement Council. It also requires child welfare caseworkers within the Division of Child and Family Services (the division) to use evidence-informed or evidence-based safety and risk assessments to guide decisions concerning a child throughout a child protection investigation or proceeding. It requires a juvenile court to consider the division's safety and risk assessments to determine whether a child should be removed from the custody of the child's parent or guardian. It also modifies the division's requirements for completing background checks before placing a child in emergency placement. Also, it requires the division, through contract with the Department of Health, to establish and operate a psychotropic medication oversight pilot program for children in foster care to ensure that foster children are being prescribed psychotropic medication consistent with their needs. It also includes a sunset to the pilot program. "

Fiscal Note: Enacting this bill could increase total costs for Medicaid by an estimated \$4.3 million in FY 2015, \$335 million in FY 2016 and \$450 million in FY 2017. By FY 2021 the total cost increase could be around \$625 million. In fiscal year FY 2016, federal funding will cover these cost increases and reduce the State's share of costs. The bill deposits the General Fund cost share decrease of \$10.2 million in FY 2016 into the Medicaid Growth Reduction and Budget Stabilization Account. In FY 2017 costs to the General Fund could be \$0.4 million. By FY 2021 the bill's General Fund cost could be an estimated \$50 million. If enactment of this bill results in more currently eligible, but not enrolled Medicaid clients signing up for Medicaid, then there could be costs of \$10.6 million General Fund and \$24.0 million federal funds in FY 2016 and \$27.8 million General Fund and \$65.7 million federal funds in FY 2021. If everyone eligible enrolled for Medicaid under enactment of this bill, total costs could increase for Medicaid by an estimated \$4.3 million in FY 2015, \$745 million in FY 2016 and \$940 million in FY 2017. By FY 2021 the total cost increase could be around \$1,310 million. In FY 2017 costs to the General Fund could be \$10.0 million. By FY 2021 the bill's General Fund cost could be an estimated \$115 million.

Description:

This bill would expand Medicaid coverage to families who fall into 130% of the poverty line. In our state that would mean health care coverage for 95,000 adults and 29,000 children who currently do not qualify.

Impact on Children:

The PTA feels very strongly that children need proper health care. They will be able to come to school better prepared to learn when they are healthy and happy.



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Fiscal Note: Enactment of this bill requires the Lieutenant Governor's Office to verify signatures for the State Board of Education membership. Based on the minimum number of signatures required and the number of candidates from the last election, it is estimated that \$30,000 in personnel costs for temporary employees will be needed each election cycle to verify signatures. An additional \$15,000 one-time is for laptops and supplies. This bill also requires the voters be residents of the State Board of Education district. This would require approximately 120 hours to set up the signature verification module in a statewide database and verify that boundaries are correct for an estimated cost of \$9,000 one-time.

Description:

This bill provides for partisan election of the members of the State Board of Education and provides for appointment of the members of the State Board of Education if the voters pass a constitutional amendment permitting appointment.

Impact on Children:

The State Board of Education directs the work, policies, and education standards, set by the State Office of Education. This direction impacts the education of every student enrolled in public education in the state of Utah. The election of State School Board members should be as close to the voters as possible, no matter what their political affiliation.

SB0244S1 | SCHOOL FUNDING PROVISIONS

Fiscal Note: Enactment of this bill appropriates \$21,400,000 ongoing from the Education Fund to increase the state guarantee rate for the Voted & Board Local Levy Programs as outlined in the bill. In addition to the direct appropriation, enactment of this bill may cost the State Board of Education in FY 2017, \$20,200,000 ongoing from the Education Fund to replace the school district contribution to the Charter School Local Replacement Program. Bill provisions require that funding equal to 1 percent of the Basic School Program be allocated each year, beginning in FY 2018, to increase the state guarantee rate on the Voted & Board Local Levy Programs. This increase is estimated at approximately \$26,000,000 ongoing from the Education Fund in FY 2017 and will vary in future years depending on the prior year appropriation for the Basic School Program. The FY 2017 amount is reduced by (\$26,000,000) one-time from the Education Fund because the 1 percent of Basic School Program adjustment for the state guarantee rate takes effect in FY 2018. All components together may cost the State Board of Education \$41,600,000 ongoing in FY 2017 and \$67,600,000 ongoing in FY 2018 from the Education Fund to fund the programs outlined above.

Description:

This bill amends the state contribution guarantee amount for the voted and board local levies and enacts language stating the use of guarantee funds can be for any educational purpose.

Impact on Children:

This bill would require 1/3 of future funds available for a WPU increase to go toward increasing the state guarantee rate. The Weighted Pupil Unit (WPU) is given to every school on a per pupil basis. The state guarantee rate goes to school districts who have a high property tax effort, but low property tax values. This bill would take funding from the WPU, which helps all children, and give it to the state guarantee rate which helps children in property poor districts.
