enhanced kindergarten competitive grants. The bill also rescinds a presumed base budget appropriation of \$7,500,000 from the Education Fund to the Related to Basic Early Intervention Program, for a net increase in appropriations of \$10,000,000. Of the total appropriation, the State Board can use up to one percent (\$175,000) for administrative costs.

Description:

This bill requires the State Board of Education to develop kindergarten entry and exit assessments for use by certain kindergarten student academic improvement programs. They will also administer a grant program to support certain kindergarten student academic improvement programs and gives rule making authority. This bill also recodifies and makes technical changes to provisions related to early interactive reading software and allows a public school to use an early interactive reading software license for a student in grade 4, 5, or 6 under certain circumstances.

Impact on Children:

This establishes a grant program for LEAs that desire to offer and extended day kindergarten focusing on helping students at risk of experiencing intergenerational poverty and performing below grade level in reading. It also funds a grant for educational technology programs for use in grades 1-6.

PTA Resolution: FAM 2014-1 Intergenerational Poverty

The mandatory course instructs both parties: about divorce and its impacts on their child or children, their family relationship, and their financial responsibilities for their child or children, and and that domestic violence has a harmful effect on children and family relationships.

Impact on Children:

The class offered is a huge support for parents. Offering it in an online version will be easier on the parents to complete and will help ensure they get this valuable training.

HB0094 S1 | LOCAL FUNDING OPTIONS FOR PUBLIC EDUCATION

Utah PTA-Support with Comment

Sponsor: Thurston, Norman K.

Status: House comm - substitue recommendation

Fiscal Note: Enactment of this legislation may result in a cost to the state if administering this block grant program is in addition to the Utah State Office of Education''s (USOE) current duties. However, depending on the scale of the program, there may be savings to offset that cost to the extent that USOE would no longer have to administer the current program. Costs will depend upon the number and size of districts participating in the new block grant program. Current overhead costs for administering existing programs is approximately 1.4% of pass-through funds. USOE estimates that the cost of this bill would be approximately \$125,000, which reflects one FTE (\$100,000) and current expenditures (\$25,000), ongoing per year beginning in FY 2017 for the five years of this pilot program. If a limited number of districts participate then the costs of monitoring could be less than one FTE.

Description:

This bill creates the Block Grant Funding Pilot Program.

Impact on Children:

This bill would allow local school districts to determine critical education needs and submit a proposal to the State School Board. If approved for participation, appropriated money could be used for any public education purpose.

Impact on Children:

This bill adds definitions for "physical escort." It also gives directions on what can take place with a student when physical restraint or escort is used when property is being damaged but safety is being comprised.

Fiscal Note: Enactment of this legislation will increase revenue for the State Board of Regents by enabling them to charge a one-time fee for a student to apply to participate in the concurrent enrollment program. The State Board of Regents anticipates charging a \$5 fee per student. During the 2014-2015 school year, 28,551 distinct students participated in Concurrent Enrollment. Accounting for an increase in participation (Concurrent Enrollment increased by 1,672 students from FY 2014 to FY 2015) and assuming about half will be new participants in the program, it is estimated that the revenue generated for the State Board of Regents will be about \$75,000 ongoing beginning in FY 2017

Description:

This bill repeals, amends, and enacts provisions regarding concurrent enrollment.

Impact on Children:

This bill streamlines the application process and makes it less expensive for students. The bill also expands the program to include dual immersion and update the teaching requirements.

HB0188 | PAID FAMILY LEAVE

Sponsor: <u>Romero,</u> <u>Angela</u>



Status: House filed

Fiscal Note: Enactment of this bill could cost the Division of Finance \$7,000 one-time from the General Fund in FY 2017 to

update the payroll systems and reports. To the extent that employees take advantage of the new leave type created by this bill, it could cost state agencies and higher education up to \$9,000, on average, per event in lost productivity. Assuming 1,098 employees use the new benefit, lost productivity could total up to \$9.9 million

Description:

This bill requires an executive agency to provide an eligible employee paid parental leave upon the birth or adoption of the employee's child and and requires the Department of Human Resource Management to adopt rules to administer parental leave.

Impact on Children:

Anytime a new child is brought into the home there needs to be time for the family to adjust to their new normal. Allowing new adoptive parents time with their new child will allow strong bonds to grow and give that child the best start possible.

This bill: • amends the definition of "district local property tax revenues" to include school district revenues expended for recreational facilities and revenues received from certain state guarantees, • defines terms, • amends provisions that require a school

district to allocate a certain portion of school district tax revenues for charter schools, • amends charter school facility expenditures provisions, • amends provisions related to the board local levy, • creates a levy for charter school funding, • provides for the distribution of revenues from the levy for charter school funding, • establishes the Charter School Levy Account, and • requires certain notice on the charter school funding levy

Impact on Children:

This bill would create greater accountability and transparency for charter schools by creating a separate property tax to fund them rather than diverting revenues from district imposed property taxes.

Notes: Public Charter Schools must be supported by specifically allocated public funds in amounts that do not exceed and do not divert funding from non-charter public schools.



HB0206 S1 | HUMAN TRAFFICKING SAFE HARBOR AMENDMENTS









Fiscal Note: Enactment of this legislation could increase costs to the Division of Child and Family Services (DCFS) by \$30,500 ongoing General Fund beginning in FY 2017 from referral of a child engaged in prostitution or sexual solicitation to DCFS upon the first offense instead of after the first offense.

Description:

This bill modifies the Utah Criminal Code and Juvenile Court Act regarding a child subjected to prostitution or human trafficking.

Impact on Children:

If this bill passes the Division of Child and Family Services will be required to provide services to a child who is engaged in prostitution or sexual solicitation. In addition, it allows that any child engaged in prostitution or sexual solicitation may not be subject to delinquency proceedings. It also, amends the definition of abuse in the Juvenile Court Act to include human trafficking of a child for sexual exploitation.

PTA Resolution: NPTA Resoultion-Child Trafficking

Notes: That National PTA and its constituent organizations advocate for the protection of rights of victims and support efforts to provide measures for the physical, psychological, and social recovery of victims of child trafficking.





HB0217 | SMALL SCHOOL FUNDING

Description:

This bill clarifies the authority of the Department of Human Services related to developing a system of care for minors with complex emotional and behavioral needs, and modifies the components of a system of care, and and authorizes the department to develop an information technology infrastructure to implement the system of care.

Impact on Children:

Substitue 1- renumbers the lines and adds in cleans up the wording, impact to children remains the same Children who are being treated for complex mental health issues need a lot of care. This bill will create the Systems of Care which will help the Department of Human Services ensure they are getting the care and support they need. There will also be support for the families of these children.

HB0246 | REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AMENDMENTS

Sponsor: King, Brian S.



Status: <u>House Comm -</u> motion to recommend failed

Fiscal Note: Enactment of this bill may cost the Department of Health one-time computer programming costs of \$43,800 General Fund and \$206,200 federal funds in FY 2017 and ongoing costs beginning in FY 2017 of \$500,000 General Fund and \$4,500,000 federal funds to provide family planning services to low income individuals who do not qualify for Medicaid. Additionally, enactment of this bill might cost the State Board of Education \$90,000 one-time Education Fund to establish curriculum requirements for a comprehensive human sexuality education curriculum. Of this amount the State Board of Education believes it can absorb \$65,000 because that work would be done by staff currently assigned to this kind of work.

Description:

This bill: • directs the Division of Health Care Financing to seek a waiver for family planning services, • establishes requirements for comprehensive human sexuality education, • requires the State Instructional Materials Commission to consult with parents and others when evaluating comprehensive human sexuality curriculum, • prohibits a school from receiving federal abstinence education funding, • repeals certain criminal provisions regarding contraceptive and abortion services, and

Impact on Children:

The sex ed unit taught in Health classes in Utah currently stresses the importance and benefits of abstinence before marriage, and fidelity after marriage. It is a well rounded 1-2 week until if taught correctly. It includes four major objectives including the physcial, mental, social and emotional changes that occur in the life cycle and their interrelationship, discusses skills that promote healthy and positive dating relationships and strategies to avoid unhealthy situations such as violence and coercion, and and responsibilites related to sexual development. It does discuss means of prevention of early and/or unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases. Factual information about contraception is allowed, but promoting or demonstrating contraceptive methods in the classroom is against the law. The bill seeks to change the emphasis from abstinence, to a more in-depth discussion on how to avoid pregancy and STD's when having sexual relations and completely removes any reference to marriage. This gives youth the impression that extramarital sex is fine as long as you use protection. Utah PTA cannot support comprehensive sex education in the classtoom (Resolution HEA 2000, Sex Education in Public Schools) but we can support varied counseling approaches outside of school course work, with parental permission, for those students who need additional sustained support to delay sexual involvement or return to sexual abstience.

Currently, the majority of school district tax rates are at or below the 0.0016 guaranteed by the state. School districts would need to raise property tax rates in order to qualify for additional state funding in fiscal years 2018 through 2020.

"This bill: • amends the definition of ""district local property tax revenues"" to include school district revenues expended for recreational facilities and revenues received from certain state guarantees, • defines terms, • amends provisions that require a school district to allocate a certain portion of school district tax revenues for charter schools,

▶ amends charter school facility expenditures provisions, ▶ amends provisions related to the board local levy, ▶ creates a levy for charter school funding, ▶ provides for the distribution of revenues from the levy for charter school funding, ▶ establishes the Charter School Levy Account, and ▶ requires certain notice on the charter school funding levy"

Impact on Children:

This bill would create greater accountability and transparency for charter schools by creating a separate property tax to fund them rather than diverting revenues from district imposed property taxes.

We believe that any school board not elected directly by the people in a nonpartisan manner introduces politics into public education and removes the focus from the education of the children of our state onto politics and political games.

 Education and \$2.5 million ongoing from the General Fund to the Department of

Workforce Services to implement the High Quality School Readiness Program outlined in the bill. Enactment of this bill may also cost the Department of Workforce Services \$100,000 one-time in the current fiscal year for set-up and programming expenses.

Description:

This bill requires the Department of Workforce Services to determine eligibility for an Intergenerational Poverty Scholarship and creates the Student Access to High Quality School Readiness Programs Grant Program to expand access to high quality school readiness programs for eligible students. This bill also creates the Intergenerational Poverty School Readiness Scholarship Program and, establishes early childhood education training. It also requires the State Board of Education to contract with an independent evaluator to conduct an ongoing evaluation of the effectiveness of high quality school readiness programs.

Impact on Children:

This bill will provide more funding for high quality early education for low income at-risk students. With early intervention these student have a chance to enter kindergarten without needing further special education services. This bill also provides funding for evaluation of the effectiveness for this programs.

This bill is a Utah PTA Priority Bill. It will increase and stabilize the distribution from the permanent State School Fund. It will insure that the distribution of the fund through the School LAND Trust program reflects the needs of current beneficiaries as well as

continuing to grow the fund balance for future beneficiaries.



This bill will allow the DCFS not to get involved unless its suspected that force or coercion is involved. This will also protect families from the unintended trauma that happens in these circumstances. Currently under the law the DCFS has to treat any perpetrator the same. We want to avoid a child from being treated the same as a 40 year sexual predator who is abusing children.

Fiscal Note: Enactment of this bill appropriates \$21,400,000 ongoing from the Education Fund to increase the state guarantee rate for the Voted & Board Local Levy Programs as outlined in the bill. In addition to the direct appropriation, enactment of

this bill may cost the State Board of Education in FY 2017, \$20,200,000 ongoing from the Education Fund to replace the school district contribution to the Charter School Local Replacement Program. Bill provisions require that funding equal to 1 percent of the Basic School Program be allocated each year, beginning in FY 2018, to increase the state guarantee rate on the Voted & Board Local Levy Programs. This increase is estimated at approximately \$26,000,000 ongoing from the Education Fund in FY 2017 and will vary in future years depending on the prioryear appropriation for the Basic School Program. The FY 2017 amount is reduced by (\$26,000,000) one-time from the Education Fund because the 1 percent of Basic School Program adjustment for the state guarantee rate takes effect in FY 2018. All components together may cost the State Board of Education \$41,600,000 ongoing in FY 2017 and \$67,600,000 ongoing in FY 2018 from the Education Fund to fund the programs outlined above.

Description:

This bill amends the state contribution guarantee amount for the voted and board local levies and and enacts language stating the use of guarantee funds can be for any educational purpose.

Impact on Children:

This bill would require 1/3 of future funds available for a WPU increase to go toward increasing the state guarantee rate. The Weighted Pupil Unit (WPU) is given to every school on a per pupil basis. The state guarantee rate goes to school districts who have a high property tax effort, but low property tax values. This bill would take funding from the WPU, which helps all children, and give it to the state guarantee rate which helps children in property poor districts.
